Welcome back next week to most Derby schools

7 Jan 2022

Landau Forte College is one of a tiny number of Derby schools who have led the way this week and they have already seen how many positive tests have arisen from the return to school testing in secondary schools this term. If this is replicated, we can assume more than 5% of children could be positive without realising it. This will not be unique to Derby – nationally there is a belief that up to 1 in 15 people could have Covid at the moment. We also know that PCRs have been in short supply along with lateral flow tests for the general public (although we believe that there are enough in schools at the moment). In light of this, leaders and education staff will find a letter from Dr Dewis with revised advice for the forthcoming few weeks. Areas covered include clarification about LFT and PCR tests and what it is reasonable to expect at the moment – changes in advice are based on the availability of tests and the extremely high prevalence of cases rather than a change in belief about good health management. We hope that this will be temporary, maybe up to half term (?) and that the positive rate will subside after that. Some leaders have raised concerns about false positives – don't worry about that at the moment because with so much about this is unlikely to be a major issue.

We continue to advise against large gatherings of pupils or adults, such as assemblies or other big groups and we understand the inevitability of staff shortages and the impact this will have on teaching and learning arrangements, particularly in light of the lack of suitable and willing supply staff.

We are unsure about how we will receive information from national reporting on LFT results once the follow-up PCR requirement is reduced. We would be very grateful for your support in continuing to report to CCT and to Jayne Hadfield so that we can cross-check locally with information from Test and Trace. The spreadsheets are invaluable in this regard – we have attached another copy for you. We also really appreciate leaders' assistance with contact tracing but understand that the current volume may make this nigh on impossible.

We are so sorry Derby leaders are facing this again – please know we understand and care.

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
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Changes since December for mainstream schools





Although most of this is unchanged, leaders can pay attention to:

- Face coverings – From January 4th, DfE recommend that in those schools where pupils in year 7 and above are educated, face coverings should be worn in classrooms (but not in subjects like PE where the face covering would impact on the ability to take part). Pupils in these schools must also wear a face covering when travelling on public transport and should wear it on dedicated transport to and from school. DfE would not ordinarily expect teachers to wear a face covering in the classroom if they are at the front of the class, to support education delivery, although settings should be sensitive to the needs of individual teachers. In primary schools, we recommend that face coverings should be worn by staff and adults (including visitors) when moving around in corridors and communal areas. Health advice continues to be that children in primary schools should not be asked to wear face coverings. Face coverings do not need to be worn when outdoors. Schools, as employers, have a duty to comply with the Equality Act 2010 which includes making reasonable adjustments for disabled staff. They also have a duty to make reasonable adjustments for disabled pupils, to support them to access education successfully. No pupil should be denied education on the grounds that they are not wearing a face covering.
- Updated section on Confirmatory PCR tests - You should follow the latest government guidance on confirmatory PCR tests in Stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection following a positive LFD test. - Additional advice in the section on 'When an individual develops COVID-19 symptoms or has a positive test about the return to school' - Pupils, staff and other adults should follow public health advice on when to self-isolate and what to do. They should not come into school if they have symptoms, have had a positive test result or other reasons requiring them to stay at home due to the risk of them passing on COVID-19 (for example, they are required to quarantine). If anyone in your school develops COVID-19 symptoms, however mild, you should send them home and they should follow public health advice. For everyone with symptoms, they should avoid using public transport and, wherever possible, be collected by a member of their family or household. If a pupil is awaiting collection, they should be left in a room on their own if possible and safe to do so. A window should be opened for fresh air ventilation if possible. Appropriate PPE should also be used if close contact is necessary. Further information on this can be found in the use of PPE in education, childcare and children's social care settings guidance. Any rooms they use should be cleaned after they have left. The household (including any siblings) should follow the UKHSA stay at home guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection. Pupils and staff should return to school as soon as isolation rules allow.

As a reminder, you must regularly review and update your risk assessments - treating them as 'living documents', as the circumstances in your school and the public health advice changes. This includes having active arrangements in place to monitor whether the controls are effective and working as planned. Our Derby Health and Safety Team have updated the risk assessment framework in light of all of the new arrangements.

And for special schools...



Most of this is the same as for mainstream. The face covering for pupils Year 7+ is the same although leaders will continue to understand the difficulties of wearing face coverings for some pupils. Changes specific to special schools are:

- Update to Residential specialist settings section to clarify reporting requirements for any children and young people not in their setting.
- Update to the Home to school transport section to confirm the continuing option of personal travel budgets / mileage allowances.

Clarification on the changes to the self-isolation period for individuals who test positive for COVID-19

Since Wednesday 22 December, the 10-day self-isolation period for people who record a positive PCR test result for COVID-19 has been reduced to 7 days in most circumstances, unless you cannot test for any reason (in which case you need to complete the 10 days). Individuals may now take LFD tests on day 6 and day 7 of their self-isolation period. Those who receive two negative test results are no longer required to complete 10 full days of self-isolation. The first test must be taken no earlier than day 6 of the self-isolation period and tests must be taken 24 hours apart. This also applies to children under 5, with LFD testing at parental or guardian discretion. If both these test results are negative, and you do not have a high temperature, you may end your self-isolation after the second negative test result and return to your education or childcare setting from day 7.

Testing for secondary students after the holiday period

Secondary school students have been asked to undertake one on-site test, on return in January. This will help boost testing participation, identify positive cases, and reduce transmission after a period of social mixing during the holidays. Students should then be strongly encouraged to continue testing twice weekly at home and to [report all results to NHS Test and Trace](#) and to their setting. Staff in all education and childcare settings, should take one self-test at home either the evening or morning before they return in January, then continue to test twice weekly at home. (Even if someone has tested positive for COVID-19 within the last 90 days, they are strongly encouraged to take part in LFD testing on-site through ATS or at home once they have completed their isolation period for their prior infection.)

To support on-site testing on return, schools can use the [bulk upload](#) service to register test kits and report results for up to 100 tests at a time. Positive results should be reported within 24 hours after the test, negative results must be reported within 7 days. Further guidance on bulk uploads can be found on the [secondary schools and colleges document sharing platform](#).

Settings were invited to order tests before Christmas and should have received these in advance of pupils returning. If you run out of test kits, you can order more through the [online ordering platform](#) for education settings. Please call 119 if you require further advice or support.

Confirmatory PCR tests to be temporarily suspended for positive lateral flow device (LFD) test results

Confirmatory PCR tests following a positive lateral flow device (LFD) test result are to be temporarily suspended from Tuesday 11 January. This will mean that anyone who receives a positive LFD test result will be required to self-isolate immediately and will not be required to take a confirmatory PCR test.

In Derby, the lack of availability of PCR tests will have a practical impact on the advice provided last term from Dr Dewis about household contacts. We will address this situation in the introduction to this bulletin.

Information on the vaccination programme for 12 to 15 year olds

Students aged 12 to 15 in England are now being offered a second dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine at a minimum of 12 weeks from the first dose, following advice from the Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation (JCVI). Nationally, about half of this age group have had their first dose. Parents can book vaccinations for their child, if aged 12 or over, through the [NHS booking system](#).

Vaccination for this group will also continue to be carried out by the school age immunisation service (SAIS). In school vaccination will begin from Monday 10 January. Your SAIS team will be in touch if you have not yet heard from them.

To support the ongoing vaccination rollout, the DfE have updated the ["how to" guide for schools](#). This guide includes useful information and resources for schools, including a template letter that can be used to communicate with parents.

UKHSA advice service opening hours

The UKHSA advice service (for information and advice on dealing with outbreaks in settings) opening hours have changed. The advice service is available between 8am and 4pm Monday to Friday and 10am to 4pm Saturday and Sunday.

If you think you have an outbreak of COVID-19 at your setting and need help taking action, please call the helpline on 0800 046 8687 (during these hours) and press option 1, then option 1 again. **Please continue to inform CCT and Jayne Hadfield as you have been doing. We will be continuing to respond to your need for local advice.**
