This mission is as urgent in the U.K. as it has ever been and we help pupils to think deeply about how hate led to genocide and what our responsibilities as citizens are. Ultimately, the Holocaust was not a one off but rather the darkest chapter of an on-going story. Our contemporary purpose is to teach the "Why" of the Holocaust, not simply the "What", and we are different because our programmes are rooted in the testimony of our survivor family alongside their artefacts.



Our exhibitions and gardens are found nowhere else. We are a place for learning and creativity. Our expert educators teach skills for life. It is because of this that we are an award-winning museum. **Arts Council England has awarded us the prestigious 'National Portfolio Organisation' status.**



The prize we seek is knowledgeable and empathetic citizens. Our main aim is for students to think critically and in new ways. The core values underpinning our programmes are the development of knowledge, making links between the past and the present, and critical thinking. We achieve this through delivery in multiple formats, on our site as well as online. We can even come to you. We worked with over 30,000 students last year who were studying topics across the National Curriculum, in areas such as History, English, Citizenship and PSHE. Primary Schools

Onsite: £8.50 per pupil. Extras £1.50 per pupil.

4 hours (10:00 to 14:00, 10:30 to 14:30 or 11:00 to 15:00)

- Educators lead pupils through our Journey Exhibition. This follows Leo, a young German Jewish boy in the 1930s. To find out more, visit: <https://journey.holocaust.org.uk/>
- Students learn about how ordinary people can become refugees.
- Choose our *Be Inspired to Write* option for a writing skills workshop.

Online Outreach: £150 for two classes on a zoom call, or one class in school.

2.5 hours (9:30 to 12:00)

- Based on the life of Leo!
- Using our Journey app, which can be downloaded on the Apple and Google stores, our educator will lead an interactive session considering Leo's story and what this means for modern-day societal challenges.
- Students will be able to ask questions as well as take part in discussions on themes such as discrimination and responsibility.

Secondary Schools

Onsite: £8.50 per pupil.

4.5 hours (10:00 to 14:30, 10:30 to 15:00 or 11:00 to 15:30)

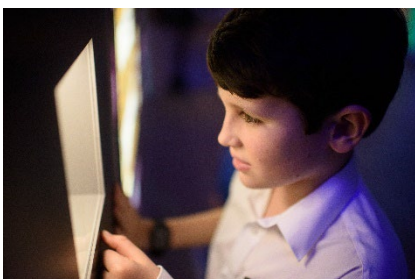
- Visit our Main Exhibition and take part in educator-led workshops.
- Students learn about the two-thousand years of hate that led to the Holocaust and evaluate the responsibility of different groups. Comparisons are made with the present-day as students consider the challenges caused by modern social media.



Online: £175 for up to 100 students on a zoom call.

3 hours (9:00 to 12:00)

- Workshops with an educator who will deliver interactive sessions on the evolution of the Holocaust, the different individuals and groups who perpetrated the Holocaust, as well as a discussion on the bystanders, few upstanders, victims and survivors.
- The content is linked to the challenges of modern societies in combating discrimination and abuse of power.
- This will be followed by live survivor testimony session via zoom.



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Post-16

Onsite: £8.50 per pupil.

- Visit our Main Exhibition and take part in educator-led workshops.
- Students analyse the psychological and societal stimuli that caused actions and failures to act during the Holocaust.
- The programmes satisfy curriculum requirements in History, English, Psychology, Art, Photography, PSHE and Citizenship. Our educators deliver your sessions with a focus on your requested subject.
